Do you know way to get S.J. noticed?

San Jose needs a lot these days more police officers, transparent government, affordable housing and a more vibrant downtown all come to mind.

One thing that doesn't come to mind is a theme song, but we've got one now, anyway.

The four-minute jingle called "I'm on the Way to San Jose" was unveiled Thursday at a news conference for the Celebrate San Jose music festival

The idea behind the song is to make San Jose more marketable to out-of-towners. "Any great city, any grand city has an identity that people can tell you about," said **David Sharp**, editor in chief of San Jose-based Soul Mag. "When you mention San Jose to people... there is no identifiable entity that makes San Jose stand out."

The music was written and performed by Franco Herrero, a San Jose native and founder of the Christian Latin jazz band Masada. The lyrics were provided to Herrero, and with lines like "from Santana Row to the City Hall," I'm betting the convention and visitors bureau had a hand in it.

Google, Yahoo, eBay and Intel also get mentions, which is strange because only eBay carries a San Jose address. Maybe Adobe needs to hire a songwriter.

Of course, there's already a well-known song that has the words "way" and "San Jose" in its title. Convention and Visitors Bureau marketing director Bob Marx said it's too expensive to license the 1968 Dionne Warwick hit, so the bureau will use this new rhythm-and-horn-driven song with a similar title to tout the city at trade shows. The song is fun, Marx said. "That's the word we want to get across to people."

The song's not available yet, but expect to hear it later this summer in TV commercials and possibly on the radio.
